#### **Our Growth**

In 1955, CHS began serving six children in Sedalia, Missouri. Since then, CHS has continued to provide services and supports to over 5,000 individuals with disabilities in 39 counties in Missouri. Our program areas include Service Coordination, Community Living, Employment Services, and Family and Child Development.

#### **Our Mission**

At Center for Human Services, we strive to be the leading service provider in Missouri for individuals with disabilities, their families, and new and expecting parents that need our help. Our mission supports our organizations efforts in Creating Opportunities and Changing Lives for those we serve.

#### **Service Coordination**

Service Coordination provides case management services from three years old through the adult lifespan. It helps people navigate through the service array system by advocating, coordinating, and connecting them to resources and services.

<u>Services Provided-</u> Targeted Case Management in Audrain, Benton, Callaway, Clay, Dallas, Hickory, Jackson, Platte, and Polk Counties.

- 2647 persons served in FY21
- 92% (158 out of 172) of referrals received a response within 24 hours.
- 93% (2425 out of 2601) of Individual Service Plans were delivered to the provider agency two weeks prior to the implementation date and to the individual/parent/ guardian by the implementation date.
- 98% (5794 out of 5906) of the individuals received a monthly home visit or telehealth visit by a Service Coordinator.
- 95% (8012 out of 8449) of the individuals had a quarterly support monitoring completed.
- 99% of the persons served reported that their SC was accessible, responsive, and supported them in the service planning process.

#### **Community Living**

Residential Services provide income eligible housing options, as well as support and training for people with disabilities in their community in a manner which values their choices, encourages independence and promotes inclusion.

<u>Services Provided</u>- Residential Habilitation, Day Services, Affordable Housing, Nursing Consultation, Community Integration, and Individual Skill Development.

- In 2021, 34 adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities were served in our residential program providing holistic supports to every aspect of their life.
- There are 84 Individuals living in CHS affordable housing apartments.
- 85% of individuals receiving CL support services either achieved or made significant progress on Individual Plan goals.
- 100% of Community Living individuals served, guardians and other stakeholders expressed satisfaction with the services provided to them or their family members.
- 78 individuals participated in Activity Center programs.

#### **Employment Services**

The CHS Employment Services Department is designed to provide you with any support you may need finding employment in your community. We work with anyone who wants to be employed ranging from teens seeking their first jobs through adults looking for a career. CHS has a variety of services designed to help you find the job that is right for both you and your family. We strive to help anyone that walks through our doors find a career that excites them.

- 165 individuals received various services through the Employment Services
   Department.
- 148 individuals received benefits planning from our Certified Disability Benefits
   Specialists.
- 27,084 hours were worked in paid positions by individuals supported by the Employment Services Department in FY21.
- \$298,823 in wages were paid to individuals who received paid positions through the support of the Employment Services Department in FY21.

#### **Family & Child Development**

CHS provides a variety of Family and Child Development services from prenatal to age three.

<u>Services Provided</u>-First Steps System Point of Entry (Regions 6 & 9), Early Head Start, Safe Sleep Program, and Aquatics Program (classes and therapy).

### First Steps System Point of Entry (SPOE) Regions 6 & 9

- SPOE 6 received 1,370 referrals, and 1,131 children were served with an active IFSP during this time period.
- SPOE 9 received 1,298 referrals, and 1,336 children were served with an active IFSP during this time period.

#### **Aquatics Program**

- 63 participants were served in the Aquatics Program.
- 10 Garlich Activity Center participants attended water exercise thought-out the year.
- 6 classes were offered during the year, serving 48 water walkers.
- 4 Water walking classes were offered 2 times a week.

#### Safe Sleep Program

 16 families received a Pack 'n Play with safe sleep educational materials for their newborn infant.

#### **Early Head Start**

- 100% of available slots served eligible children.
- 297 infants and toddlers plus 29 pregnant women were served, which involved 222 families.
- 99% of the children and pregnant women had health insurance and had an ongoing source of continuous accessible health care.
- 92% of the children were up-to-date on a schedule of age-appropriate preventative and primary health care.
- 91% of the children were up-to-date on immunizations appropriate for their age or received all possible at that time.
- 19% of children enrolled in EHS were determined eligible and received First Steps early intervention services.
- 17% of children enrolled were dual language learners.
- 68% of enrolled children were receiving services under the Special Supplemental
   Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC).
- 7% children enrolled experienced homelessness sometime during the program year.
- 22% of EHS children aged out at of the program this program year, receiving a transition packet with Kindergarten entry expectations and learning activities for Kindergarten preparation.
- Federal FA 1 monitoring was conducted during FY21 with no findings or areas of improvement needs.
- The Harris Center continued to maintain the Missouri Accreditation status.
- Children and Prenatal Women Enrollment Eligibility.

#### **School Readiness Aggregated Data**

The TS GOLD assessment measures the knowledge, skills, and abilities that are most predictive of school success. The tool has been organized into six areas of development and learning. The six domains of approaches to learning are physical, language, literacy, mathematics and cognitive. The end of year data for the 2020-2021 program year showed that at least

- 87% of the enrolled children in each period where at or exceeded the national standards in all developmental area.
- 92% made growth/progress overall for the 2020 2021 program year, including
  the children in First Steps with identified disabilities which was an overall increase
  from the prior program year.
- The Mathematics Domain showed the lower percentage of progress of the developmental domains, which continues to be a staff and family training focus.
- 150 parents volunteered time toward parent meetings, policy council and coteaching school readiness goals at home for a total of 30,423 combined hours.

#### **Development**

The Development Department raised funds to support the programs and individuals served. Through the generosity of many donors and volunteers, we were able to offer most of our annual specials events, some in person and some virtual. The annual golf tournament and online auction proved most successful as well as the Thanksgiving Day Turkey Trot. Donations are also received through the memorial and honorarium program. The direct mail campaigns featured success stories of individuals and families. The community support from local service clubs and organizations certainly made an impact. We reached out to hundreds of supporters from all over the nation to share the CHS mission.




